YFCU GO ONLINE

In a move to help communications amongst the organisation during the current pandemic, YFCU turned to online platforms such as Zoom and Facebook to continue the event calendar. The use of these online platforms has meant that members are able to communicate and participate in meetings and events.

Michael Reid, YFCU CEO, commented on the importance of moving to online platforms: "At the core of all we (YFCU) have done for 90 years is competition and personal development. In these difficult times, it is essential we continue to compete. I have been amazed by the enthusiasm of the staff and members to embrace a range of virtual tools to communicate initially and now compete.

Being busy is key to our mental wellbeing so we will use Zoom, Teams, Facebook Live and YouTube over the next few months for a mixture of fun, training and competition to keep members busy."

The Ulster Young Farmer 25-30 Final, one of the YFCU's most prestigious competitions, was the first virtual competition, which saw four finalists present their findings to a panel of three judges using the online platform of Zoom.

Judge, Peter Alexander, commented: "Although somewhat strange carrying out a competition virtually the Ulster Young Farmer worked very well. Members were able to share their screens and present their presentations to the judges. Some members had to remember that we couldn't see them pointing at the screen with their finger and had to use the mouse instead. However, it all ran smoothly and was great to be able to complete the competition."

This medium has turned out to be very successful and will in no doubt change how some competitions, meetings and events are conducted in the future as it not only cuts down travelling between sites, it also allows competitions to be accessed by a larger amount of members.



Spa YFC have adopted a novel approach to keeping spirits high during lockdown using social media. As the clubs are unable to meet for their usual busy calendar of outings and events, Spa YFC are staying connected through social media and showcasing what members are getting up to.

Using the hashtag #SpaKeepsFarming, and with a different member of Spa YFC every day, the club have been able to showcase a 'Day in the life' on both Instagram and Facebook. The response has been extremely positive, with young farmers from other clubs all over NI (and further afield in England, Scotland and Wales) logging in to see what members are getting up to on their farms in County Down.

Sarah Dorman, Spa YFC remarked: "Social media had become shrouded in negativity amidst the COVID-19 pandemic - we thought, what better way of highlighting the resilience and adaptability of the key workers in our club than through a positive online campaign."



Across the Hedgerow

YFCU, along with Rural Support, launched 'Across the Hedgerow' - a free confidential service to provide vulnerable, elderly and isolated members of the rural community with listening support and companionship via telephone.

The aim of this project is to help reduce feelings of isolation and improve the mental wellbeing of both the client and the volunteer.

Zita McNaugher, YFCU President stated: "Members of the Young Farmers' Executive Committee have volunteered to take part in this new initiative with Rural Support. We are delighted to be involved and play a part in supporting rural communities during this uncertain time. We are looking forward to having a chat with anyone that feels





vulnerable, lonely or isolated during this time and hopefully our members can provide a listening ear and maybe even brighten up someone's day."

Speaking about the new project, Veronica Morris, Chief Executive of Rural Support said: "Our helpline has seen a marked increase in calls since the escalation of the COVID-19 situation and more and more of those are from vulnerable and older members of the rural community who are isolated and afraid. In order to really help these people navigate what is the new normal for the foreseeable future, the 'Across the Hedgerow' project, in collaboration with the Young Farmers' Clubs of Ulster, will provide our most vulnerable people with extra human connection on a regular basis, via the phone, to help lift their

spirits and bring some happiness during this uncertain time.

Traditionally older and vulnerable people can be in the hard to reach category so this project will help Rural Support to identify people most in need ensuring they are getting the help they need to protect their mental health and wellbeing, as well as connecting them to the right services if they need it. It will also provide a small bit of respite and comfort to their loved ones knowing that there will be someone else checking in on them and providing additional care and a listening ear at this time of uncertainty and fear."

YFCU COVID-19 COMMUNITY GRANT SCHEME

Over the last few months, YFC's have stepped up to the challenge of helping those in need in rural communities to help with the fight against the Coronavirus. Clubs organised food banks, collected groceries, picked up prescriptions, delivered PPE, and even distributed letters of hope.

A Model for Effective Rural Youth Work

The Young Farmers Clubs of Ulster are leading the way in rural youth work, with the launch of '5:3 A model for effective Rural Youth Work'.

This vital piece of work helps identify what is different for youth organisations in rural areas and where the needs for assistance have been developed.

Over a 9-month period Beth Ferguson met with 143 young people aged 11-25 across three Council Areas identifying what was important to them and then worked with Government, Councils and Service Providers to develop a youth practice model that impacts future practice for the benefit of rural youth by reducing social isolation of young people in rural areas.

The Rural Youth Practice Model is 5:3 - 5 Pillars & 3 Foundations:

Pillars (Main issues)

- 1. Public Transport
- 2. Mental Health
- 3. Time and Location
- 4. Skills and Personal Development
- 5. Shared Space and Resources

Foundations

- 1. Youth Engagement
- 2. Flexibility
- 3. Community Partnership







YOUNG FARMERS SEES YOU MENTAL HEALTH CAMPAIGN

YFCU launched their mental health campaign **#YFSeesYou** during Mental Health Awareness Week in May.

The campaign saw seven members taking over the YFCU Facebook and Instagram stories for the day, focusing on seven different topics of mental health such as: isolation, community to social media.

The idea behind the campaign was to show what members are up to during the pandemic and getting members to connect with each other. Some members may

have felt very isolated and alone due to the time they were spending at home so this campaign acted as a reminder that we are all in this together and support is always available.

TOGETH

This initial campaign is only just the start a strategy to provide members with mental health awareness, support and training over the incoming years.

YELLOW WELLIES 600 MILE CHALLENGE

In May, Kilraughts YFC began an epic lockdown challenge to raise money for the Yellow Wellies 'Mind Your Head' campaign. This campaign was started with the aim of breaking the stigma surrounding mental health in the agriculture industry.

The challenge wasn't for the faint hearted... each club taking part was asked to walk, run or cycle a total of 600 miles in just one week, which is roughly the distance to walk to every club in Northern Ireland.

To date four clubs have taken part: Kilrea YFC, Collone YFC, Lisbellaw YFC, and Trillick & District YFC. The challenge is still ongoing, and these amazing clubs have already raised almost £4000!

The absolute necessity for Northern Ireland's livestock farming industry to further reduce its reliance on antimicrobials was the main focus of a webinar recently hosted by the YFCU and DAERA.

The event, which took the form of a Question and Answer Session with a panel of four experts in the field of animal health and antimicrobial resistance (AMR), was jointly chaired by YFCU Agriculture and Rural Affairs Chair Jessica Pollock and DAERA's Deputy Director of Animal Health & Welfare Policy Jim Blee.

The panelists were:

- Seamus Camplisson Head of Health
 Protection Branch, Department of Health
- Cathal Carr AVSPNI President
- Robert Huey Chief Veterinary Officer
- Colin Smith Industry Development Manager, Livestock and Meat Commission NI

The aim of the Q&A was to:

- Raise awareness of Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR)
- Build working relationships with DAERA Veterinary Service and Animal Health Group
- Further raise the awareness of the need for good biosecurity on farms

Jessica and Jim stressed the need for farmers to address the challenge of improving the general health standards 'enjoyed' by the animals in their care. The pair also pointed to the need for 'improved biosecurity' to become a reality on every farm in NI.

In the Q&A session that followed, Robert Huey stressed the significance of the 'One Health' strategy agreed jointly by the veterinary and medical professional in 2019. He added: "Both professions are on the same page when it comes to tackling AMR. The reality is that patients are dying right now with conditions such as cystic fibrosis and chronic lung disease because the bacteria causing these debilitating health problems are totally resistant to all the antibiotics that are currently available."

The Chief Veterinary Office confirmed that antimicrobial usage rates have fallen considerably within Northern Ireland's livestock sectors over recent years. He commented:

"Major strides have been made by poultry and pig producers but progress is still very slow within the dairy, cattle and sheep sectors. Dairy is the next priority sector, as the latest figures would indicate that antibiotic usage rates are still worryingly high within that industry."

Colin Smith pointed to the greater use of E medicine books within the pig and poultry sectors, adding: "We are also dealing with significantly smaller numbers of farmers within these industries. As a result, it is relatively straightforward to collate the information that is available from these businesses.

"In contrast, there are many more producers within the red meat industry. Most livestock farmers still use traditional medicine books, which makes it much harder to get a firm grasp of how they actually use antimicrobials.

"A major push is now being made to get more accurate and current information from these businesses farms, where antimicrobial usage is concerned. We need better data."

Colin also profiled the key role of the Farm Quality Assurance Scheme (FQAS) in helping to deliver better management standards, across the board, where cattle and sheep farms are concerned. He commented: "Leading food companies are also playing an important role in driving down the use of antimicrobials within agriculture. A case in point is McDonald's Corporation's zero tolerance policy regarding the use of certain key antibiotics within the beef sector. Very soon organisations like this will be asking the fundamental question: do we need antimicrobials of any kind when it comes to managing farm animals?"

Cathal Carr stressed the need for all farmers to prevent diseases from getting a grip within their herds and flocks in the first place. He said: "Better management practises will help reduce the level of pneumonia and other diseases in calves and other young animals. A greater commitment to vaccination will also help to lower disease levels across the board on farms. In lots of cases, young animals are being reared in facilities that are not fit-for-purpose. Many farms across Northern Ireland still feature buildings that are up to 80 years' old."

Both of the veterinarians on the panel highlighted the need for farmers to



use antimicrobials responsibly at all times, citing the adage: use antibiotics as little as possible but as much as is necessary.

Seamus Camplisson endorsed the 'One Health' strategy. He said that medical doctors are being encouraged to reduce their reliance on antibiotics when treating patients, adding:

"Northern Ireland has the highest prescription rate for antibiotics in the UK. This has to change."

Camplisson welcomed the fact that greater numbers of DAERA staff are now working on the challenge of AMR. But he held out little hope of new antibiotics being the 'silver bullet' that will solve the AMR debacle. He explained: "There is no financial incentive for pharmaceutical companies to develop new antibiotics," Any new drugs coming on to the market will be used as treatments of last resort. As a consequence, their use will be quite restricted. This, in turn, puts a big question on whether or not manufactures will ever recoup their development costs."

All the panellists were pleased that there was such a good turnout of young people for the webinar and the fact that so many of them actively participated in the event.

Robert Huey concluded:

"We are relying on our young and educated farmers to change the industry. The future is theirs."

Cathal Carr

Cathal Carr has been in Veterinary practice in Coleraine since 1996. Originally from Dublin, he graduated with a Physiology degree from Trinity College Dublin before going on to The Royal 'Dick' Veterinary College in Edinburgh. After a short time in mixed practice in Dromore, Co. Down, Cathal moved to mixed practice in Coleraine.

After seven years, Cathal and his wife Anne Marie took the opportunity to purchase a small animal practice. They now concentrate mainly on Small Animal and Equine first opinion practice while still doing some TB testing. Cathal has an interest in all types of veterinary and has been particularly involved in veterinary business having been on the board of the Society of Practising Veterinary Surgeons from 2014 to 2020.



Robert Huey

Robert Huey took up the position as Chief Veterinary Officer for Northern Ireland in November 2013.

He joined Veterinary Service in 1989, having spent five years in general mixed veterinary practice in Maghera, Co. Londonderry.

After a period in general field duties, there followed a period teaching 'Animal Health' in Loughry Agricultural College, a general emersion

in meat hygiene issues and promotion various policy and delivery roles. From 2002 to 2009 he was responsible for the delivery of DARD meat hygiene services for the Food Standards Agency Northern Ireland.

He holds the RCVS Diploma in Veterinary Public Health (Meat Hygiene), is co-author of 'Meat Hygiene', and has been awarded a Fellowship of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons and an Associate Fellowship of the Royal Agriculture Society.

Robert has been involved in veterinary politics for many years. He has held the positions of President of the North of Ireland Veterinary Association, the Veterinary Public Health Association and the Union of European Veterinary Hygienists, a specialist section of the Federation of Veterinarians of Europe. He chaired the FVE Working groups on food hygiene and on the welfare of animals at slaughter both of which worked with the European Institutions on changes to legislation.



Colin Smith

Colin has been Industry Development Manager with the Livestock and Meat Commission (LCM) for Northern Ireland since 2012. He has overall budget responsibility for a wide range of business activities from the Northern Ireland Beef and Lamb Farm Quality Assurance Scheme to LMC's Education Services and Consumer Promotion Activity.

In 2018 Colin joined the Board of Animal Health and Welfare Northern Ireland. Colin is a graduate of the University of Newcastle Upon Tyne and after returning to Northern Ireland worked as a Policy Officer and Senior Policy Officer with the Ulster Farmers Union for five years covering the Animal Health, Pigs, Poultry, Rural Enterprise and Rural Development portfolios in this time. Colin has also completed an Advanced Diploma in Management Practice from the University of Ulster.



With the ongoing high rate of fatal farm accidents in 2020, Minster Creed, Minister Poots, Minister Dodds and Minister Humphreys have urged all farmers across the island of Ireland, and all of those involved in agriculture, to play their part and reduce the rate of farm incidents

In a joint appeal the Ministers said: "We all have a long association with farming and have all seen first-hand the devastation that follows farm incidents and fatalities

"It is very concerning to see a surge in the number of fatal farm incidents on our farms. This year, there have been 15 fatal incidents on farms on the island of Ireland, with 12 fatal incidents in the South and three fatal incidents in Northern Ireland." Three children and eight people over 65 have died this year. Thirteen have occurred during the Covid-19 restrictions.

The Ministers continued: "There has been a remarkable level of public awareness across both jurisdictions of the need to flatten the Covid curve. Faced with an overwhelming public health imperative, practices such as physical distancing, coughing etiquette and hand sanitising have become a cultural norm. We need a similar and immediate effort if we are to make a real impact on the prevalence of farm incidents. Farm safety has to be built into our DNA. We have demonstrated with our collective response to Covid that this can be done.

Research shows that farmers and contractors are generally aware of the risks, but often don't adhere to the safety rules or take specific steps to ensure that the work they are engaged in can be done safety.

Farm safety cannot be left to someone else. It has to be lived by the farmer, by all of us, and built into the routine."

You should always plan your work, take a moment to **STOP** and **THINK**:

- How am I going to do this job safely?
- Do I have everything I need'
- Are there other people or hazards (machinery, obstructions, livestock) in the area I'm working in?

Simple basic precautions can reduce the risks and prevent future accidents. This is particularly important at present during the Covid-19 restrictions as more people are at home and on the farm including young children and older members of families.

This competition recognises this next generation of talented young photographers, helping them to grow and flourish. Entries were judged by NI wedding and lifestyle photographer, David Scott.




TOP MARKS FOR KILREA YFC AT THE NI QUIZ

Environmental Sustainability focuses on four main aspects:


- 1. Building and maintaining healthy soil


Rathfriland YFC
